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Chapter - 1: Introduction:


Chapter-2: Geographical background of the study area-

2.1: Location:

Mauriapara village is located just 3km away from Dhupdhara. It is situated on the north-eastern part of Dhupdhara which falls under Dighali Gram panchayat under Ranyuli tribal Block in the Gwalpara district. Mauriapara village lies between 25.97994°N latitude and $91.048721^{\circ}\text{E}$ longitude. Dighali in the East part, Maslam in the west part and Dighali in the north part and sutarpara village in the south part of the Mauriapara village. 2.3: Economic condition:





There is a alarming evidence that important dipping points, leading to irreversible changes seen in major ecosystem in village.



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CHAPTER-1 : INTRODUCTION

1.1: Statement of the problems:-

Socioeconomic is the position of an individual or a group on the socioeconomic scale, which is determined by a combination of social and economic factors such as income, kind of education, type and prestige of occupation, place of residence or parts of society-ethnic origin or religious background.

The socioeconomic structure can influence how an individual interacts with his or her environment and the health implications of that interaction. Socio-economic structure determine the rate of structural learning, affect institutional performance economic status.

The fundamental problem in socioeconomic structure is with the issue with scarcity of resources. Socioeconomic has also pointed out that man's need cannot be fulfilled, scarcity implies a limited quantity of resources. During the study of our area we have found many socioeconomic problems in regarding to the educational sector where people in this village are less educated and pay less importance on education including the roads in this village are not proper developed which leads many problems for the villagers for the transportation and communication. We have also found that the village doesn't has any health services and other services. Considering there problems.

The main motive of our study is to bringout the various economic problems of the area and to examine the socioeconomic structure of the area.

1.2: Objective of the Study :-

1.3: Methodology :-

CHAPTER-2: GEOGRAPHICAL BACKGROUND OF THE STUDY AREA


2.1: Location

Mauriapara area is situated on the north-eastern part of Dhyupdhara which falls under Dighali gram panchayat under Ramjuli Tribal Development Block in the Goalpara district. The geographical location of the area is between $25^{\circ}58'46.5''$ North latitude and $91^{\circ}03'03.2''$ East longitude.

2.2: Physiography :-

Mauriapara is the eastern plain area of Goalpara district. Physiographically the study area of Mauriapara is characterized by an almost flat plain. It has an average elevation of 35 metres or 144 feet. The Petavokla and Mariki river flows southward to northward near the village and most land of the village are used in agricultural field. It is plain area still some small hills are also found near the village. Ambari hill is one of the hills. In this area some mixed forest is also seen.

2.3: Drainage :-

The Petabhokla river flows through the Mauriapara village. It is situated in the eastern part of Dhubdhara. The origin of the river is from Meghalaya. The water of the river is unclean because of the people that lives near the river. Most of the people of the area come for fishing in the river in summer season.

2.4: Climate :-

The climate in Mauriapara is moderate during the winter and in summer, it is hot. Rain makes its first appearance in the month of April with occasional and irregular light showers and at times, heavy down pour is followed by cyclonic storm. This irregular rainfall continues up to the end of May it occurs to the influence of Northeaster wind. Monsoon rain normally begins from the early part of the month of June and heavy rain occurs in the district till the month of September. The maximum temperature is 33 degree celsius during July and August, a minimum temperature falls up to 21 degree celsius in the month of January.

2.5: Soil :-

Soil consist of mechanical mixture and chemical components of the materials found on the surface

of the earth. It is an important resource. The soil of Mauriapara area are alluvial soil, laterite soil, black soil etc.

▣ The alluvial soil that composes this part may be divided into two groups—

- ① The old alluvial and
- ② New alluvial.

The old alluvial soil occupies the higher ground than the new alluvial.

2.6: Flora and fauna :-


Flora and fauna are very important for a region for its development. 



ST Population Structure.








3.5.2: Transport and Communication :-

CHAPTER-4: SUMMARY And CONCLUSION

The study villages is one of the most backward area of the villages of the Goalpara district. The literacy rate is lower, infrastructural facilities are poor and secondary sector of occupation are yet to get importance in this area, which brings about depressed condition of area. Hence the economic development process of the villages under study.

The people generally live in the primary sources of agriculture, labour, etc. The agriculture itself has remain dominant at subsistence level. Change in the economy needs a dramatic change in basic socio-economic aspects.

Cumulative efforts towards recognised agriculture and availability are considered to be the recognised to be the immediate need of the people. The region has got several industries besides, fishing, poultry, bee keeping, farming etc. may also be encourage in the village. If crops pattern is change and farmer are encouraged to develop lands in variable land intensive agriculture is the only solution for economic betterment of rural masses. In doing so extensive service and training facilities are highly necessary.

Steps should be made to provide training facilities for fishing development of dairy farming, piggery, poultry development etc. are necessary in this regards.

Following few measures for the development of the village may be undertaken :-

- (i) Spread of agricultural extensive through the block head quarter.
- (ii) Training facilities for tertiary activities.
- (iii) Winter irrigational facilities.
- (iv) Intensification of agriculture and introduction of high yielding varieties seeds, especially of the paddy crops.
- (v) Development of road communication and effective flood control measure in this flood prone area.
- (vi) Extension of power ~~supply~~ supply times to the rural area and adopting of liberal licensing policy for the mini rice milles and power loom etc.

If the efforts are made as suggested the back warded rural area is expected to change its socio-economic milieu at a much faster rate in the place of development.
